

### TRIP REPORTS

### Labor Day Weekend, Bighorn Crags Area of the River of No Return Wilderness

Beverly Chin and Art Gidel joined leader Dan Weinstein for a 3-day trip in this spectacular area west of Salmon, Idaho. The area can be easily reached by driving about 50 miles of dirt road. There is a car campground at the trailhead, and the road is good.

The terrain is very near that in the high Sierra, with numerous exposed granite crags and spires. The elevation gain is nominal, unless one-day hikes down 5,000 vertical feet to the Middle Fork of the Salmon River are taken.

Dan and Art scrambled numerous ridges, and made one short, unroped, nerve-racking ascent of a nearby crag. Numerous technical climbs are possible in the Bighorn Crags. The only detraction from this trip were signs of heavy use and the very extensive trail system. Outhouses are in place along several lakes.

After a wearisome bushwhack to Lucifer Lake, the group raced darkness back to the trailhead. Darkness won. As advertised, this is a strenuous day trip.
